### INTRODUCTION

The Friendly Societies' Movement originated in the United Kingdom in the 19th century, and was an important precursor to present day medical benefit funds. Its objective was to serve the ordinary man, particularly those from the lower middle class, in the advancement of a better life, through the provision of:

sick pay whilst unable to work, funeral allowances to relieve a family when the bread-winner died, medical attention and access to reasonably priced quality medicines

The Movement became strong in Tasmania and a *Friendly Societies Act* was passed in 1888, closely founded on its 1875 UK counterpart. United Friendly Societies' (UFS) dispensaries were opened in Launceston on 1 October 1879 and Hobart in 1884. This coincided with increased recognition of pharmacy as a profession, a Launceston Pharmaceutical Association being established in 1884. Within a few years members of the Association were objecting to the trading practices of the Launceston UFS Dispensary, which included large sales to the public beyond its charter to dispense and supply medicines only to its members and their families.

Led by W A Solomon and A R Fowler, representatives from the Launceston United Friendly Societies first met at the Workmen's Club in Elizabeth Street on 25 July 1879. It was not until 11 September the same year that they finally resolved to establish the Dispensary. The original 762 members came from seven societies - the Ancient Order of Foresters, Olive Branch Tent and Star of Tasmania Branch (Independent Order of Rechabites), Manchester Unity (Independent Order of Oddfellows), Protestant Alliance Friendly Society, United Ancient Order of Druids and the St Patrick's Society (joined in 1880 after withdrawing initial interest the previous year). Membership of the Dispensary remained small in the early years, and many members paid two subscriptions to support it. However, membership increased steadily subsequently - 1,609 in 1889, 2,168 in 1899 and nearly 6,000 in 1929.

The Launceston UFS Dispensary was reorganised in 1916, a board of management consisting of one delegate from each member society replacing the original committee structure. The same year F H Ralph succeeded W A Solomon as secretary. Member societies also changed over the years. Some dissolved, others joined (eg Hibernian Australasian Catholic Benefit Society (1889), St John Benefit Society (1898), the Australian Natives' Association (1900) and the Coats Patons Employees' Mutual Benefit Society in the early 1920s. The latter represented a progressive move by the former Patons and Baldwins Company not common amongst large employers at that time.

The Launceston UFS Dispensary, later called the Friendly Pharmacy, has operated continuously since it first opened, surviving concerns about declining membership in the early 1950s and a legal dispute centred on possible closure in the mid 1970s. It celebrated its centenary at the end of July 1979. The present building at 86a St John Street was built in 1957 on the site of its original premises, although between July 1892 and 1921 the Dispensary was located on the north-western corner of St John and Elizabeth Streets. Since 2007 the pharmacy has been called Terry White Chemists (*Examiner 5* April 2008, p. 9 and Telstra *Launceston & North Eastern Tasmania phone book*, 2008).

The collection was donated to the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in 1994, 1995 and 1997.
