INTRODUCTION

James Stanley (known as 'JS' and Stan) Forward, well-known radio personality, pioneer Kentish Christian Brethren churchman and hardware businessman, came to Tasmania at the age of five from Wiltshire, England. Born in 1877, he was one of a family of 10 children. In his teens, following the death of his parents, he went to work in the Sheffield district. In the late 1890s he became active in the Kentish Gospel Hall Church and in May 1903 married Lilian Morse (1882-1953) whose family were also members. They had four children. J S Forward subsequently had businesses in Tullah, Wynyard (1913-1916), Scottsdale (1916-1920) and Launceston (1920-c1942). J S Forward Pty Ltd, ironmongers, at 87 Brisbane Street, was essentially a hardware store. In later years 'JS' worked at J R Green's hardware store in the city. He had connections with this firm whilst managing his own store in Scottsdale many years previously.

J S Forward continued to be active in the Gospel Hall Church and in 1931 was asked to produce a Christian broadcast program for the Launceston radio station 7LA. This session ran for some 30 years and at the time was considered to be the oldest continuous session of its type in the Australian broadcasting industry. Also widely respected for his hospital visitation work, which was related to his radio program and possibly also to an earlier association with the establishment of the North-Eastern Hospital at Scottsdale, J S Forward was awarded an MBE in 1956. He died in Launceston on 20 December 1963, aged 87.

The collection was donated to the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in August 1994. It relates almost entirely to J S Forward's Wynyard and Scottsdale hardware businesses in the period 1914-1920. A scrapbook, donated separately in 1990 (1/6), contains letters of appreciation for his hospital work and 7LA program (1942-1947).
