

FOR OUR ELDERS

We're excited to invite students from Kindergarten to Grade 6 to be part of the next *ArtStart* exhibition at the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery.

The exhibition is based on the NAIDOC theme for this year: For our Elders.

Elders past and present are held in the highest of regard and play a key role in our communities. They are 'cultural warriors', and at times have been seen as radicals and political activists. Elders are the holders of cultural knowledge and wisdom. We pay homage to our Elders and their strength in their fight for recognition as being the traditional owners and custodians of country.

Students are invited to create a visual representation by taking inspiration from this year's theme, and are encouraged to explore and experiment with pattern, texture, materials and content, creating works in any medium, such as drawing, painting, mixed media, written word, photography, poetry, collage, ceramics or mixed media.

ArtStart entries are to be delivered to the Queen Victoria Art Gallery, 2 Wellington Street, Launceston before 4pm Friday 2 June 2023. Artworks must be no larger than 30cm x 60cm.

TEACHER INSPIRATIONS

Read The First Scientists: Inventions and Innovations from Australia's First Peoples by Corey Tutt, and Iuwa tara Iuwa waypa by David mangenner Gough and Samantha Campbell.

Students can also research local Elders. For example, Aunty Lola Greeno, Aunty Phyllis Pitchford, Aunty Patsy Cameron, Uncle Jimmy Everett, Uncle Michael Mansell, and Uncle Brian Mansell. There are many other Elders, past and present, in lutruwita and nationally.

CROSS CURRICULUM PRIORITIES

<u>Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Histories</u> and Cultures:

Through The Arts, students learn about the central place of the arts in the oldest continuous living cultures in the world. They explore how First Nations Australians recognise and communicate connections to Country/ Place through cultural expressions that draw on belief systems connected to the lands, seas, skies and waterways.

<u>Sustainabilit</u>

Through The Arts, students can explore how ideas and perspectives about issues such as living sustainably, equity and social justice are represented in arts works from all times and places. Engaging with these arts works and practices builds students' ability to appreciate diverse world views and provides opportunities for them to explore the importance of the arts to cultural sustainability.

NOTIFYING ARTISTS

Schools will be informed by email which of their students' works have been selected and be provided with an invitation template for these children, their teachers, and the school's principal for the exhibition launch.

SELECTION CRITERIA

Schools may submit work from more than one year level. Teachers may submit a maximum of 15 pieces of work per school. Artwork must be completed by a child from Kindergarten to Year 6. Art will be selected based on representation from each school, year level and suitability for a curated exhibition, but within these parameters work is selected on the basis of:

- · Strength of visual message
- · Elements of design
- · Originality in interpretation of theme.

COLLECTION OF ARTWORK

Unselected artwork, and artwork from previous exhibitions, must be collected from the Art Gallery either at the exhibition opening, or at a later time by arrangement. The Queen Victoria Art Gallery is unable to return works to schools and no work will be kept longer than one month after the exhibition closes.
