INTRODUCTION

The Launceston Chamber of Commerce was established in August 1849 and is the third oldest organisation of its type in Australia. Its objectives are:

to promote trading, commercial, shipping and manufacturing interests in Tasmania

to disseminate information about and protect general commercial interests

to maintain a code of practice appropriate to business transactions relating to trade, commerce and industrial matters

to cooperate with organisations with similar objectives

For many years, the organisation had a reputation for being run by the 'Brisbane Street barons'. It has taken a close interest in many major issues and projects, such as the impact of the 40-hour week, the development of the Missing Link (Great Lake highway), Launceston Airport and port facilities, Albert Hall Convention Centre, the Launceston Casino complex, and major changes in local government resulting from the 1985 amalgamation of the Lilydale, St Leonards and Launceston Councils.

By the early 1990s the Chamber of Commerce had 350 members, representing transport, architecture, banking, building societies, insurance, accountancy, engineering, manufacturing, retailers and wholesalers, wool brokers, auctioneers, real estate and hospitality interests. A detailed classified list of members regularly appears in the Chamber of Commerce's annual reports.

Past presidents include many well known names - H Du Croz, H Dowling, Hon W Hart MLC, S J Sutton MHA, J W Pepper, P O Fysh, Sir Claude James, A C Ferrall, Sir Gordon Rolph, John Gunn MBE and Sir R A Ferrall. In 1993, it elected its first woman, Joan Finlay, to the executive.

The Chamber of Commerce is a strong supporter of free enterprise and small business. It continues to represent commercial interests in the city, plays a role in the development of new industries and takes pride in its leadership in promoting Launceston as a gateway for regional tourism and other interests.

The collection was donated to the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in August 1999 in connection with the Launceston Chamber of Commerce's sesquicentenary exhibition that year. Prior to this it was on loan to the Launceston Library (L MSS 073). To avoid confusion, the same arrangement and item numbering used by the Launceston Library has been retained. An additional item was donated in March 2002 (see record no. 31).
