INTRODUCTION

The Tasmanian Musical Festival Society (TMFS) was formed in Launceston in 1942. The Society had four aims:

to encourage music students and give them other opportunities of performing in public, show the best quality of music performers in Tasmania and thereby stimulate the ambition of other students,

educate the public in the love of good music, especially the youth, raise money for war purposes during the war.

Prime movers in forming the TMFS were Dr Rudolf Werther, Mrs Elsie Tilley (nee Corrick) and Mr Douglas Caddy. The Society was most successful and during the twenty years of its existence presented fifteen different operas for seventeen seasons. Eight of these productions were grand operas, four were musical comedies and two were Gilbert and Sullivan operettas: all received high praise in newspaper reports. The National Theatre was the venue for Launceston performances.

By 1962 society had changed, demanding higher standards particularly in music, and by the time it folded that year most of the objectives of the TMFS had been achieved. Several factors led to its demise including the formation ABC symphony orchestras and concerto and vocal competitions, the National Theatre and Fine Arts Society in Hobart which provided outlets and employment for talented students leading to a drift of talent to the south, and the advent of television.

The collection was donated to the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in January 2005, with additional items also donated in January 2005.
