INTRODUCTION

The Launceston Branch of the Arts Council of Australia, Tasmanian Division, was inaugurated on 4 March 1975, following the final annual meeting of the Northern Division of the National Theatre and Fine Arts Society (NATFAS). An executive committee was elected identical in membership to that of NATFAS.

Initially there was a decline in membership due to a divergence of interest between members of the Arts Council of Tasmania and those of the former Northern Division of NATFAS. An association was established with the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in order to revive the Branch's activities in the field of fine arts: in 1977 a room for Arts Council members was made available at the Museum and members received invitations to QVMAG exhibition openings. A representative from the Northern Regional Library was on the Branch's committee, the liaison between the Branch and Library proving mutually beneficial. Cooperation with the Royal Society of Tasmania's Northern Branch was initiated in 1979 and in 1983 a close association was established with the Launceston Film Society.

Branch newsletters, commencing in 1976, record the many and varied activities undertaken by the Branch, which also supported Tasmanian Division activities and projects in schools in Launceston and surrounding areas. Newsletters were headed 'Arts Council of Australia, Tasmanian Division, Launceston Branch' until the end of 1986, after which time they were called 'Arts Council Newsletter, Launceston Branch'. There are no newsletters for 1993 and the last one in the collection, for Spring 1994, is headed 'Launceston Arts Council Newsletter'.

In 1980 the branch was the largest numerically in the state. Members offered hospitality to visiting artists and supplied interval refreshments at the Princess Theatre for major and local productions and interstate tours. From 1981 to 1983 the Saturday Club provided regular activity for young people.

The 1989 annual report recorded one of the most successful events conducted by the Branch – 'Launceston in words and music', consisting of readings from local history sources interspersed with music written by local composers nearly 100 years previously. The highlight of 1990 was the Max Oldaker exhibition held at the Northern Regional Library. The last item in the collection is a cassette recording produced by the Launceston Arts Council of a concert to celebrate the life and music of Alexander Frame Lithgow held in November 1994.

In 1999, following a change of name for the Tasmanian Arts Council, the Branch became known as Tasmanian Regional Arts, Launceston Branch.

The collection was donated to the Queen Victoria Museum and Art Gallery in June 2006.
